

Chairman's Report

Since my last report in the autumn of 2016 your Parish Council has made some progress against the key objectives set out in the Earnley Parish Plan 2016 – 2021. The Parish Council has limited funds and so progress is dependent on influencing and working with other organisations and bodies which can sometimes be a slow process. We have however made progress on the majority of these objectives as follows:-

Meetings have taken place with West Sussex County Council Highways on the possibility of some simple traffic calming measures at some key locations; this is still at an early stage. Traffic calming measures for Clappers Lane and the centre of the Earnley Village Conservation Area will become a live project once the developer starts constructing the 'no left turn in' / 'no right turn out' site access with a central island in Clappers Lane.

Whilst on the subject of this housing developments; we were able to negotiate a cycle/footpath just inside the site parallel to Clappers Lane which then

Earnley Church restoration under way

At the heart of Earnley village lies our much–loved 13th Century listed 2* Parish Church. It has



welcomed many people over the centuries, to worship, for weddings, christenings, funerals, carol and pet services; for art and craft shows, public meetings and receptions. It is always open, providing a welcome haven for many.

The Church Council (PCC) would like to take this opportunity of thanking everyone who responded to our July restoration appeal letter. As a result we have already raised over £4,000.

This year the PCC invested in an extensive internal redecoration. There was an enormous amount of preparation needed; much filling of holes and drying out before the special paint could be applied. The cost was about £7,000, which we have met from fund raising and a legacy. A new oak gate and notice board have been kindly donated and this work is now completed.

However, like any old building, the church is in constant need of maintenance. Our changing climate has eroded some of the large stones on the exterior south wall. These need replacing and, to prevent the everincreasing winter rain and storms continuing the damage, we need to install a gutter with down pipe along the south side and an escape through the east churchyard wall. In addition, work is required to restore the path to the porch; painting of the old barge boards is also recommended in the architect's recent report.

Work on the path and the stone replacement is planned shortly.

As you will realise the cost of all of this will be considerable. A conservative estimate is £12,000.

Thank you for helping to keep our historic little church in good order and safe for future generations.

gives safer and direct access through the development to Bracklesham shops etc.

The second Earnley Fete was a great success both from a financial aspect but more importantly as a community activity. I would like to give a big 'thank you' to Louise, Sandy, all the volunteers and of course to Celia & Ian, for making the fabulous location available.

Flood prevention projects continue to be driven forward by Robert Carey with the Grange Rife diversion being the next major project.





We managed to persuade BT to paint the 'listed' telephone kiosk in the centre of the village. This only took 2 years, which is an improvement on the time taken to get the black & white finger posts project completed! Another general project has been the replacement of the bus shelter opposite Eastern Lane.



I have had residents ask me about the frequency and quality of the verge grass cutting. This is a responsibility of West Sussex County Council and reflects the financial constraints the County Council is under. As a Parish Council we could supplement the existing verge cutting with the aim of improving safety and the appearance of the parish, but it would mean an increase in the parish precept. Recycling Week

Cllr. Carey volunteered to help Chichester District Council's Promote Recycling week .."I enjoyed my time at Waitrose,



publicising Recycling Week and meeting and talking with shoppers. I persuaded a number of them to try the on-line quiz, of which about a third were stars, scoring 100%. The most frequent errors were thinking that shredded paper could be recycled (it can't, the machines can't handle it) and thinking that aluminium cartons couldn't be. Dog Fouling is an Offence – Don't Tolerate it!



We all know how thoroughly unpleasant it is to come across dog waste caused by a few inconsiderate dog owners. Unfortunately there seems to have been an increase in such incidents in our parish of late, especially along public footpaths, in the Medmerry Nature Reserve and in our caravan parks. Dog waste is a health hazard: it can cause a nasty condition called toxocariasis that can lead to breathing difficulties and even blindness. Children are particularly at risk.

Our District Council have recognised this problem and are putting more resources into combatting it, including more wardens and remote cameras in rural areas. More significantly they are willing to follow up and prosecute. A fixed Penalty Notice of £100 will be issued (reduced if paid within 14 days). Failure to pay may lead to the dog owner being prosecuted and, if found guilty, will result in a fine of up to a £1,000 and a criminal record. This new initiative will also be applied to help reduce fly-tipping and littering.

We do not have to tolerate dog fouling: there are many dog bins around and owners can put the dog waste in their domestic black bin, provided it is in a sealed plastic bag. Your parish council would encourage you to report cases of dog fouling and this includes putting dog waste in a bag and just leaving it on the ground or hanging in a tree. Please contact Chichester District Council Dog Warden Service using the details below, giving as much information as possible: when and where the fouling occurred, a description of the owner and dog, possibly a car registration number and, if you know it, the name and/or address of the owner. The information given will be treated in the strictest confidence.

Fly tipping in the Parish...

Unfortunately recently there has been a significant increase in fly tipping in the Parish. A particular hot spot for this anti-social behaviour is the Medmerry Nature Reserve car park. Drew, the Community Warden, has done a sterling job of removing most of this rubbish and if he is not able to fit it in his van he arranges to have it removed.

If you see anyone fly tipping please try and get the registration details and make and model of the vehicle and report it to Chichester District Council. The District Council have successfully prosecuted a number of fly tippers recently and they can only do this with your help to compile the evidence.

The District Council spend £1 million a year clearing litter and fly tipping and I am sure you will agree this money could be better spent elsewhere on other services. The District Council have recently resolved to make litter a priority and are entering into a contract with Havant District Council to employ Enforcement Officers. We will be notifying these officers of the problem areas in our Parish.

Are you aware that if you employ a trader to take away your waste and they fly tip it - YOU are liable for prosecution—The maximum fine is £50,000 and there is the potential jail sentence. Ensure you ask to see and take a copy of the trader's waste carrier's licence.
